
# Vision, Mission, Core Change Strategy

#### Vision

We envision Texas to be the national leader in treating people with mental health needs.

### **Mission Statement**

To provide independent, nonpartisan, data-driven and trusted policy and program guidance that creates systemic changes so all Texans can obtain effective, efficient behavioral health care when and where they need it.



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- Since our founding in 2013:
  - Texas behavioral health funding is up over \$1.8 billion.
  - Legislators have "found" over \$3 billion more.
- Two legislative sessions: 42 of 48 legislative priorities passed.





# Four Care-Focused Policy Goals

- 1. Eliminate the need to use the jail for mental health care delivery.
- 2. <u>Eliminate expulsions</u> due to unmet mental health needs in schools.
- 3. 100% of <u>first episode psychosis</u> detected, treated, and remitted.
- 4. 100% of <u>depression</u> detected, treated, and remitted.


### The Progression of Mental Health Conditions


- <u>Half of all mental health conditions manifest by age 14</u>; interventions work best <u>at this early stage</u> when symptoms are *less severe*, *more treatable*, and *more readily kept from escalating* to more dangerous conditions that increase risk.
- By young adulthood, **75% of lifetime cases have presented**.












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
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## **Growing Forensic Commitment Waiting List**

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# 85(R) SB 292


SB 292 (Huffman, Nelson, Schwertner) created the Mental Health Grant Program for Justice-Involved Individuals.

- GOAL to reduce: (1) recidivism rates, arrests, and incarceration for people with mental illness; and (2) the wait time for forensic commitments of people with mental illnesses to a state hospital.
- FUNDING \$12.5 million in fiscal year (FY) 2018 and \$25 million in FY 2019, plus \$5 million per fiscal year for Harris County. It was just reauthorized through FY 2021 at that level.
- APPLICANTS must be a <u>county-based community</u> <u>collaborative</u> and provide a local match of 1:1 in large counties and 1:2 in smaller counties.






# Progress Thus Far – SB 292 (Urban)



# Progress Thus Far – SB 292 (Rural)




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## Jail Vs. Care in One County: Dallas in 2016



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

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Parkland

- 4,019 total responses to calls for service;
- 3,377 connections to care;
- 22% (over 875 people) resulted in hospital diversions to community care, and only 5% resulted in an emergency detention;
- 12% (over 460 people) resulted in jail diversion (over 460 people diverted from arrest); and
- 1.7% of contacts resulted in an arrest for a new offense.

While the total volume for psychiatric emergency detentions (PEDs) presentations at Parkland Health & Hospital System (Parkland Hospital) increased, the volume of people presenting from zip codes within South Central Patrol District decreased.

> The total volume of PEDs presented at Parkland experienced a +5% increase from 2017 to 2018.

> > The volume of PEDs presented at Parkland from zip codes within South Central experienced a -9% decrease from 2017 to 2018.

### Tulsa police pilot program to handle mental health 911 calls to begin compiling data as it seeks funding



IRVING, TX -- The Irving Police Department is launching a new mental health response team. Under the guidance of the Meadows Mental Health Policy Institute's Caruth Smart Justice Program, the department created the team consisting of three specially trained officers and a mental health professional. These people will provide "a comprehensive response to calls involving behavioral health emergencies as well as outreach and follow-up calls as necessary," the department said in a news release. **THE CHALLENGE:**<sup>1</sup> In the City of Dallas, in recent years, there has been an increasing number of 911 calls from people who require mental health assistance. Traditionally, the response has been to transport these people to local emergency departments or, if medically stable, arrest and book them in the Dallas County Jail where they can receive psychiatric services. Between 2012 and 2015, the number of 911 mental health calls requiring an ambulance response increased by 59% (from 2,176 to 3,452 calls). The South Central Dallas Patrol District saw the bulk of that increase during 2012 and 2015 – from 382 to 706 calls, the equivalent of an 85% spike.
