Dear Chair Murray and Ranking Member Burr:

On behalf of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), I am writing in support of confirmation of Dr. Miriam E. Delphin-Rittmon as the next Assistant Secretary for Mental Health and Substance Use and Administrator of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. NAMI values Dr. Delphin-Rittmon's two decades of experience in the mental health field and her commitment to creating a mental health system that fosters dignity, respect, and meaningful community inclusion.

NAMI is the nation's largest grassroots mental health organization dedicated to building better lives for the millions of Americans affected by mental illness. The communities we serve and advocate for are as diverse as our nation. NAMI is a voice for youth and adolescents, veterans and service members, individuals involved with the criminal justice system, those experiencing homelessness, family caregivers and everyday Americans who are impacted by mental illness. She also has extensive experience in the design, evaluation and administration of mental health, substance use and prevention services and programs.

We believe Dr. Delphin-Rittmon is well situated to step back into a leadership role at SAMHSA and we proudly support her confirmation. We look forward to working with her to ensure that all people with mental health conditions, including those with the most serious mental illnesses, live

fulfilling lives supported by a community that cares. We urge the Committee to move expeditiously on her nomination.
