## TOPLINE & METHODOLOGY

### About the Study

This NAMI/Ipsos poll was conducted October 27-29, 2023, by Ipsos using the probability-based KnowledgePanel®. This poll is based on a nationally representative probability sample of 2,048 general population adults age 18 or older.

The topline is trended with four surveys. The first survey was conducted October 22-25, 2021, the second was conducted May 20-23, 2022, the third was conducted September 23-26, 2022, and the fourth survey was conducted June 2-11, 2023 all for NAMI by Ipsos. The October 2021 survey was based on a nationally representative probability sample of adults age 18 or older (N=2,049). The May 2022 survey was conducted based on a nationally representative probability sample of adults age 18 or older (N=2,045). The September 2022 survey was conducted on a nationally representative probability sample of adults age 18 or older (N=3,071). The June 2023 survey was conducted on a nationally representative probability sample of adults age 18 or older (N=2,073). The margin of sampling error for this study is plus or minus 2.3 percentage points at the 95% confidence level, for results based on the entire sample of adults. The margin of sampling error takes into account the design effect, which was 1.11. The margin of sampling error is higher and varies for results based on other sub-samples. In our reporting of the findings, percentage points are rounded off to the nearest whole number. As a result, percentages in a given table column may total slightly higher or lower than 100%. In questions that permit multiple responses, columns may total substantially more than 100%, depending on the number of different responses offered by each respondent.

The survey was conducted using KnowledgePanel, the largest and most well-established online probability-based panel that is representative of the adult US population. Our recruitment process employs a scientifically developed addressed-based sampling methodology using the latest Delivery Sequence File of the USPS – a database with full coverage of all delivery points in the US. Households invited to join the panel are randomly selected from all available households in the U.S. Persons in the sampled households are invited to join and participate in the panel. Those selected who do not already have internet access are provided a tablet and internet connection at no cost to the panel member. Those who join the panel and who are selected to participate in a survey are sent a unique password-protected log-in used to complete surveys online. As a result of our recruitment and sampling methodologies, samples from KnowledgePanel cover all households regardless of their phone or internet status and findings can be reported with a margin of sampling error and projected to the general population.

The data for the total sample were weighted to adjust for gender by age, race/ethnicity, education, Census region, metropolitan status, and household income. The demographic benchmarks came from the 2022 March Supplement of the Current Population Survey (CPS).
